Sarah Drummond is the author of Salt Story: of sea-dogs and fisherwomen, a memoir and social history of commercial estuarine fishers. She has had essays and short fiction published in the anthology Purple Prose, Shadow Plays: an anthology of speculative fiction, Short Stories Australia, indigo journal, The Best Australian Essays 2010, LINQ Journal, Kurungabaa Journal and Overland. She has completed a PhD



from at Murdoch University in History. The Sound is her first novel.


