ABOUT THE BOOK



After graduating from university, he returned to teach in the Gascoyne–Murchison before eventually settling in Perth.






- A classic rite-of-passage novel which, though written for adults, is also suitable for readers aged 15+.

The author's father, Roy, was born in Old Fremantle.
- Michael Thomas says, 'It was a challenge to find a balance between hope and tragedy, and from my experience children seem to do it best, so William was born. How to construct a narrative from such brutality and make it resonate in a respectful and meaningful way was difficult, to say the least. To align the novel with my own family history gave me permission to tread lightly, but only lightly. It was always my intention to confront our history and avoid the trap of rewriting it. What I learned changed me.'
