ABOUT THE BOOK

Lilly May tries to count calming, soothing sheep to help her get to sleep, but Lilly May's sheep aren't the calmly kind. All 10 of them are up to no good and it takes a lot of finagling before all of them are tucked up in bed and fast asleep. The book is a delightful twist on the familiar ritual of counting sheep as Lilly May encounters a mischievous flock. The story playfully explores number and bedtime routines through lyrical language and vibrant colours.

ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR



CLASSROOM IDEAS

Goodnight Sheep pretend play

- 1. Set up an imaginative play area as a cosy bedroom. Get creative by upcycling cardboard boxes into snuggly beds for sheep plush toys, together with soft pillows and blankets.
- 2. Encourage children to re-enact positive 'get ready for bed' routines by guiding toys through calm sleep rituals. Provide picture books for preschoolers to read bedtime stories to toys in the play space.
- 3. Help children build strategies to calm the body and mind (EYLF V2.0 Learning Outcome 3.3) by guiding them through simple breathing and mindfulness techniques, learning ways to wind down at the end of the day.

Creative Writing

Discuss story structure (i.e. the beginning, middle and end) by exploring these questions together:

- a. Where does the story take place?
- b. What problem did the main character, Lilly May, face?
- c. How does the story end?
- d. Is the problem solved?

Music Makers!

- 1. Use the sheep rockstar characters in the story as inspiration for children to make their own musical instruments and band. Provide recyclable and craft materials (plastic bottles, cardboard boxes, paper towel rolls, ribbons, rubber bands, beads, tape, etc.) for preschoolers to design and create their very own DIY instrument.
- 2. Make a stage for the band to perform, and support children's understanding of key musical concepts (beat, tempo and dynamics) as they play. Sing nursery rhymes together about sheep to support language and literacy skills such as 'Baa Baa Black Sheep', 'Mary Had a Little Lamb' and 'Little Bo-Peep'.

English – Baa-rilliant Ryhmes!

Curriculum mapping - AC9EFLEO4, AC9E1LE04, AC9E2LE04

1. First, ask students to identify the rich rhyming vocabulary throughout the story:


one/fun	twice/nice

Download the Match the Rhyming Words activity sheet from the Fremantle Press website and have students match up these rhyming words.

Mathematics – Sheep Ten Frame

Curriculum mapping - AC9MFN01, AC9MFN02, AC9MFN03, AC9M1N04

- 1. First, have students create their own 'ten frame' using washi tape to make a grid on A3 paper.
- 2. Next, make 10 'sheep counters' using black and white pompoms, googly eyes and cardboard.
- 3. Then, ask students to match each numeral from 1 to 10 (use plastic, wooden or paper numbers) together with the 'sheep counters' to visually demonstrate quantities. Ask students to add and subtract numbers on their ten frame to extend numeracy learning.



Health and Physical Education - 'I am unique' poster

Curriculum mapping - AC9HP2P01

- 1. Discuss the quirky and mischievous personalities of the 10 sheep in the story with a focus on promoting positive perspectives about difference.
- 2. Next, ask each student to draw a self-portrait in the centre of a large piece of cardboard. Students can then draw pictures and add descriptive words about themselves, such as being a good friend, their family culture, their favourite games, their personal achievements, and things they like to do. Share messages about the importance of celebrating each person's uniqueness to support the development of a positive identity.
- 3. Ask students to share their poster with the class and describe the importance of respecting and appreciating their own and others' personal qualities.
